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## INTRODUCTION

The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA is a high performance, GPIB and RS232-equipped instrument capable of generating a bipolar waveform into a 50 Ohm resistance. Normally, a diode will be placed in series with this resistance, allowing diode currents of up to +0.5 A and 1 A to be generated. When used with a user-supplied oscilloscope, this instrument is useful for measuring reverse recovery times ( $t_{R R}$ ) of 8 ns to 1 us.

The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA mainframe generates two pulses internally, which are combined using a resistor/capacitor network.

A 100 us wide forward-bias pulse of $\mathrm{V}_{1}=0$ to +60 V is connected to the mainframe output through a 50 Ohm resistance. With a diode DUT (with a forward voltage drop of $V_{\text {diode }}$ ) and another 50 Ohm series resistance in the connected jig, the forward bias current is given by:

80 us after the forward bias pulse starts, a 2 us wide reverse-bias pulse of $\mathrm{V} 2=0$ to 82 V is capacitively coupled to the mainframe output. This generates a current of:

The forward-to-reverse switching time is < 1.0 ns (10\%-90\%).
The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA includes one AVX-TRR-MIX diode test jig. The instrument mainframe is connected to the test jig using one coaxial cable and one DB-9 control cable. The standard test jig contains a variety of pin sockets and posts, which may be used to hold the diode device under test (DUT). The test jig has a hinged lid, which must be fully closed to protect the user from high voltages. The output will be automatically disabled if the lid is left open. The standard AVX-TRR-MIX test jig will accommodate TO-220AC (2 lead) packages, DO-style packages with (leads bent at $90^{\circ}$ ), and standard and reverse-polarity TO-3 packages.

The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA may also be provided with different or additional a customized test jigs, to meet particular customer package requirements.

The diode-under-test is connected in series with a 50 Ohm resistance present on the test jig. In order to achieve the full $+0.5 \mathrm{~A} /-1 \mathrm{~A}$ amplitude, the diode resistance (dV/dl at high currents) must be much less than 50 Ohms (i.e., 5 Ohms or lower).

One end of the 50 Ohm resistance is connected to ground, and access to the other end is provided through a coaxial connector. This output should be terminated with 50 Ohms, and connected to a high-bandwidth (> 400 MHz ) oscilloscope. The voltage across this resistance is directly proportional to the current through the diode. By
observing the current waveform through the diode, the reverse recovery time may be determined.

While the provided test jig is intended to be flexible and easy to use, users can also develop their own test jigs easily.

The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA includes an internal trigger source, but it can also be triggered or gated by an external source. A front-panel pushbutton can also be used to trigger the instrument.

The AVR-EB4-B-NXPA features front panel keyboard and adjust knob control of the output pulse parameters along with a four line by 40-character backlit LCD display of the output amplitude, pulse repetition frequency, and delay. The instrument includes memory to store up to four complete instrument setups. The operator may use the front panel or the computer interface to store a complete "snapshot" of all key instrument settings, and recall this setup at a later time.

This instrument is intended for use in research, development, test and calibration laboratories by qualified personnel.

## SPECIFICATIONS



1) -B suffix indicates IEEE-488.2 GPIB and RS-232 control of amplitude, pulse width, PRF and delay (see http://www.avtechpulse.com/gpib).
2) For operation at amplitudes of less than $10 \%$ of full-scale, best results will be obtained by setting the amplitude near full-scale and using external attenuators on the output.
3) $D O-15, D O-35, D O-41, D O-201 A D$, etc.
4) Customized jigs available upon request.
5) The amplitude settings should not be relied upon for any degree of accuracy, because the dynamics of the device under test can affect the actual generated waveforms. Amplitude settings should always be verified by oscilloscope measurements.
6 ) The diode must have a breakdown voltage exceeding these amplitude limits. Contact Avtech for special arrangements if $I_{\operatorname{MAX}} \times 50 \Omega>\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{BR}}$.

The main output signal is provided on a shielded connector that is intended to be used with shielded coaxial cabling and a shielded load. Under these conditions, the interference potential of this instrument is low.

If interference is observed, check that appropriate well-shielded cabling is used on the output connectors. Contact Avtech (info@avtechpulse.com) for advice if you are unsure of the most appropriate cabling. Also, check that your load is adequately shielded. It may be necessary to enclose the load in a metal enclosure.

If any of the connectors on the instrument are unused, they should be covered with shielded metal "dust caps" to reduce the interference potential.

This instrument does not normally require regular maintenance to minimize interference potential. However, if loose hardware or connectors are noted, they should be tightened. Contact Avtech (info@avtechpulse.com) if you require assistance.

## INSTALLATION

## VISUAL CHECK

After unpacking the instrument, examine to ensure that it has not been damaged in shipment. Visually inspect all connectors, knobs, liquid crystal displays (LCDs), and the handles. If the instrument has been damaged, file a claim immediately with the company that transported the instrument.

The following items should be with the instrument:

1. One power cord.
2. One GPIB cable
3. Two instrumentation manuals (this manual and the "Programming Manual for -B Instruments").
4. One test jig, with a hinged lid.
5. One 2 m length of BNC-to-SMA coaxial cable. (May included an installed SMA-to-BNC adapter on one end.)
6. One 60 cm length of SMA-to-SMA coaxial cable.
7. One 2 meter DB-9 control cable.

## POWER RATINGS

This instrument is intended to operate from $100-240 \mathrm{~V}, 50-60 \mathrm{~Hz}$.
The maximum power consumption is 57 Watts. Please see the "FUSES" section for information about the appropriate AC and DC fuses.

This instrument is an "Installation Category II" instrument, intended for operation from a normal single-phase supply.

## CONNECTION TO THE POWER SUPPLY

An IEC-320 three-pronged recessed male socket is provided on the back panel for AC power connection to the instrument. One end of the detachable power cord that is supplied with the instrument plugs into this socket. The other end of the detachable power cord plugs into the local mains supply. Use only the cable supplied with the instrument. The mains supply must be earthed, and the cord used to connect the instrument to the mains supply must provide an earth connection. (The supplied cord does this.)

## PROTECTION FROM ELECTRIC SHOCK

Operators of this instrument must be protected from electric shock at all times. The owner must ensure that operators are prevented access and/or are insulated from every connection point. ## ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS

This instrument is intended for use under the following conditions:

1. indoor use;
2. altitude up to 2000 m ;
3. temperature $5^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ to $40^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$;
4. maximum relative humidity $80 \%$ for temperatures up to $31^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ decreasing linearly to $50 \%$ relative humidity at $40^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$;
5. Mains supply voltage fluctuations up to $\pm 10 \%$ of the nominal voltage;
6. no pollution or only dry, non-conductive pollution.

## FUSES

This instrument contains four fuses. All are accessible from the rear-panel. Two protect the AC prime power input, and two protect the internal DC power supplies. The locations of the fuses on the rear panel are shown in the figure below:


## AC FUSE REPLACEMENT

To physically access the AC fuses, the power cord must be detached from the rear panel of the instrument. The fuse drawer may then be extracted using a small flat-head screwdriver, as shown below:


## DC FUSE REPLACEMENT

The DC fuses may be replaced by inserting the tip of a flat-head screwdriver into the fuse holder slot, and rotating the slot counter-clockwise. The fuse and its carrier will then pop out.

## FRONT PANEL CONTROLS



1. POWER Switch. This is the main power switch. When turning the instrument on, there may be a delay of several seconds before the instrument appears to respond.
2. OVERLOAD Indicator. When the instrument is powered, this indicator is normally green, indicating normal operation. If this indicator is yellow, an internal automatic overload protection circuit has been tripped. If the unit is overloaded (by operating at an exceedingly high duty cycle or by operating into a very low impedance), the protective circuit will disable the output of the instrument and turn the indicator light yellow. The light will stay yellow (i.e. output disabled) for about 5 seconds after which the instrument will attempt to re-enable the output (i.e. light green) for abOUT1 second. If the overload condition persists, the output will be disabled again (i.e. light yellow) for another 5 seconds. If the overload condition has been removed, the instrument will resume normal operation.

This overload indicator may flash yellow briefly at start-up. This is not a cause for concern.
3. SYNC OUT. This connector supplies a SYNC output that can be used to trigger other equipment, particularly oscilloscopes. This signal leads (or lags) the main output by a duration set by the "DELAY" controls and has an approximate amplitude of +3 Volts to $R_{L}>50 \Omega$ with a pulse width of approximately 100 ns .
4. LIQUID CRYSTAL DISPLAY (LCD). This LCD is used in conjunction with the keypad to change the instrument settings. Normally, the main menu is displayed, which lists the key adjustable parameters and their current values. The "Programming Manual for -B Instruments" describes the menus and submenus in detail.
5. KEYPAD.

## REAR PANEL CONTROLS



1. AC POWER INPUT. An IEC-320 C14 three-pronged recessed male socket is provided on the back panel for AC power connection to the instrument. One end of the detachable power cord that is supplied with the instrument plugs into this socket.
2. AC FUSE DRAWER. The two fuses that protect the AC input are located in this drawer. Please see the "FUSES" section of this manual for more information.
3. DC FUSES. These two fuses protect the internal DC power supplies. Please see the "FUSES" sections of this manual for more information.
4. GATE. This TTL-level ( 0 and +5 V ) logic input can be used to gate the triggering of the instrument. This input can be either active high or active low, depending on the front panel settings or programming commands. (The instrument triggers normally when this input is unconnected). When set to active high mode, this input is pulleddown to ground by a $1 \mathrm{k} \Omega$ resistor. When set to active low mode, this input is pulledup to +5 V by a $1 \mathrm{k} \Omega$ resistor.
5. TRIG. This TTL-level ( 0 and +5 V ) logic input can be used to trigger the instrument, if the instrument is set to triggering externally. The instrument triggers on the rising edge of this input. The input impedance of this input is $1 \mathrm{k} \Omega$. (Depending on the length of cable attached to this input, and the source driving it, it may be desirable to add a coaxial 50 Ohm terminator to this input to provide a proper transmission line termination. The Pasternack (www.pasternack.com) PE6008-50 BNC feed-thru 50 Ohm terminator is suggested for this purpose.)
6. GPIB Connector. A standard GPIB cable can be attached to this connector to allow the instrument to be computer-controlled. See the "Programming Manual for -B Instruments" for more details on GPIB control.
7. RS-232 Connector. A standard serial cable with a 25-pin male connector can be attached to this connector to allow the instrument to be computer-controlled. See the "Programming Manual for -B Instruments" for more details on RS-232 control.
8. PULSE OUT CONNECTOR. This BNC connector provides the pulse output signal to the test jig. This output should be connected to the corresponding input on the test jig using one of the the supplied coaxial cables (2 meters in length).
\$ Caution: Voltages as high as 82 V may be present on the center conductor of this output connector. Avoid touching this conductor. Connect to this connector using standard coaxial cable, to ensure that the center conductor is not exposed.
9. CONTROL Connector. This DB-9 female connector should be connected to the corresponding connector on the test jig using the supplied DB-9 cable. This cable contains the safety interlock signals that ensure that the test jig lid is closed. The pinout is as follows:

Pin 1 - To test jig switch 1.
Pin 2 - To test jig switch 2.
Pin 5 - Ground.
Pin 6 - To test jig switch 1.
Pin 7 - To test jig switch 2.
Pin 9 - Safety sensor power supply (+15V through 680 Ohms).
When the test jig lid is safely closed, Pin 1 is shorted to Pin 6, and Pin 2 is shorted to Pin 7.

## TIMING CONTROL

## BASIC TIMING CONTROL

This instrument can be triggered by its own internal clock or by an external TTL trigger signal. In either case, two output channels respond to the trigger: PULSE and SYNC.

The PULSE output is a bipolar signal that may either drive a 50 Ohm load, or the test jig described later. The positive and negative amplitudes are adjustable. The pulse widths and delays are not adjustable.

The SYNC pulse is a fixed-width TTL-level reference pulse used to trigger oscilloscopes or other measurement systems.

These pulses are illustrated below, assuming internal triggering:


The forward-bias pulse $\left(\mathrm{V}_{1}\right)$ is approximately 100 us wide, and has a slow rise time (governed by the R1 $\times$ C1 time constant - see equivalent circuit in the "BASIC AMPLITUDE CONTROL" section for for details about R1 and C1.)

After 80 us, $\mathrm{V}_{1}$ has reached a stable voltage, and the SYNC output pulse is generated (to allow triggering of oscilloscopes). Shortly after the end of the SYNC pulse, the negative pulse $\left(V_{2}\right)$ is triggered, and is coupled onto the output signal. The negative pulse lasts 2 us, approximately. ( $\mathrm{V}_{2}$ droops slightly during the 2 us time, since it is capacitively coupled to the output. However, this droop can generally be ignored.) The DUT reverse recovery transient will occur within this 2 us time. After the end of the $\mathrm{V}_{2}$ pulse, the waveform will complete the forward-bias pulse, but this occurs after the recovery waveform of interest has been obtained.

The pulse repetition frequency (when in the internal mode) of the output can be varied with front panel controls or via the GPIB or RS-232 computer interfaces.

The pulse width and delay settings are shown on the front panel, but they are not adjustable.

## TRIGGER MODES

This instrument has four trigger modes:

- Internal Trigger: the instrument controls the trigger frequency, and generates the clock internally.
- External Trigger: the instrument is triggered by an external TTL-level clock on the back-panel TRIG connector.
- Manual Trigger: the instrument is triggered by the front-panel "SINGLE PULSE" pushbutton.
- Hold Trigger: the instrument is set to not trigger at all.

These modes can be selected using the front panel trigger menu, or by using the appropriate programming commands. (See the "Programming Manual for -B Instruments" for more details.)

## GATING MODES

Triggering can be suppressed by a TTL-level signal on the rear-panel GATE connector. The instrument can be set to stop triggering when this input high or low, using the frontpanel gate menu or the appropriate programming commands. When gated, the output will complete the full pulse width if the output is high, and then stop triggering. Pulses are not truncated.

## BASIC AMPLITUDE CONTROL

The basic test arrangement for the AVR-EB4-B-NXPA is shown in the figure below. The PULSE output on the instrument mainframe is connected to the PULSE input on the test jig (model AVX-TRR-MIX, or a customized variant) using the supplied coaxial cable, and the control cable is connected using the supplied DB-9 cable.


The total effective resistance of resistors $R_{A}, R_{B}$, and $R_{C}$ in the diagram above is 50 Ohms. Thus, the voltage at point " B " is simply given by:

$$
V_{B}=I_{D U T} \times 50 \Omega
$$

where $I_{\text {Dut }}$ is the current through the device under test. A 450 Ohm resistance $\left(R_{B}\right)$ is present in series with the measurement output. When a 50 Ohm resistance ( $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{c}}$ ) is installed on the output (by the user, typically in the form of a sampling oscilloscope input impedance), the output voltage will be one-tenth of $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{A}}$ due to the resistor-divider effect. That is:

$$
\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{OUT}}=\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{A}} / 10=\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{DUT}} \times 5 \Omega
$$

This is the key equation for relating the observed voltage waveform to the DUT current.

## SETTING THE AMPLITUDE LEVELS

The amplitude of the positive and negative portions of the PULSE waveform may be set from the front panel of the instrument, or by computer command. These settings are expressed in terms of the voltage present on the test jig input.

The positive voltage $\mathrm{V}_{1}$ ("AMP1" on the front panel display) is related to the forward diode current by:

$$
I_{F}=\left(V_{1}-V_{\text {DIODE }}\right) / 100 \text { Ohms, approximately }
$$

where $\mathrm{V}_{\text {DIODE }}$ is the forward voltage drop of the diode (typically 0.7 V ). The 100 Ohm resistance is the sum of $R_{1}$ in the figure above and the 50 Ohm resistance formed by $R_{A}, R_{B}$, and $R_{C}$.

The reverse current is given by:

$$
\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{R}}=\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{F}}+\left(\mathrm{V}_{2} / 50 \text { Ohms }\right) \text {, approximately }
$$

Most test procedures for measuring recovery time will use a particular ratio of forward to reverse currents - for example, $\mathrm{I}_{\text {Reverse }} / \mathrm{I}_{\text {forward }}=-2$. Under these conditions, $\mathrm{V}_{2} / \mathrm{V}_{1}=-$ 1.5.

Some Schottky diodes have negligible amounts of stored charge resulting from the forward bias, compared to non-Schottky devices. For these Schottky diodes, the reverse transient will be governed by the capacitance of the device, and the reverse transient may be largely unaffected by the amplitude of the forward transient. (In other words, the $I_{\text {REVERSE }}$ / IForward ratio is irrelevant). The capacitance may be so small that it becomes impossible to obtain the full -1 Amps of reverse current.

Normally, the forward and reverse amplitudes should be set near the maximum values $(+60 \mathrm{~V},-82 \mathrm{~V})$. Performance may degrade if the amplitudes are set lower than $10 \%$ of the maximum values.

## AMPLITUDE ACCURACY

Due to the variations in $V_{F}$ and the diode parasitic resistance as a function of operating conditions, the $\mathrm{V}_{1}$ (AMP1) and $\mathrm{V}_{2}$ (AMP2) settings should not be relied upon for any degree of accuracy - especially $V_{1}$. Instead the voltage at the OUT terminal on the test jig should be monitored with a calibrated oscilloscope. As mentioned above, $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{DUT}}=\mathrm{V} /$ $5 \Omega$.
$R_{A}$ and $R_{B}$ can be measured directly on the test jig (with the test jig disconnected) to determine calibrated relationships, if desired. $R_{C}$ is provided by the user, and can be calibrated as required.

## RINGING

The switching time from forward to reverse bias is extremely fast, less than 1000 ps. One of the trade-offs in obtaining such a fast pulse is that some ringing may be observed on the switching transition, 1-2 ns after the transition. This ringing is due to both non-perfect conditions in the pulse generator and reflections in the cabling. Generally, this ringing is minimized when operating near the maximum negative amplitude (-70 to -80V, ideally), and by using attenuators to absorb reflections as described below.

This ringing may be of concern when measuring the $t_{R R}$ of very fast low-current diodes.
For example, the waveform on the left below shows the results when testing a 1 N 4148 diode with $\mathrm{V} 1=+12.5 \mathrm{~V}$ and $\mathrm{V} 2=-15 \mathrm{~V}$, providing $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{F}}=+100 \mathrm{~mA}$ and $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{R}}=-200 \mathrm{~mA}$, approximately:


Noticeable ringing is present on the waveform.
Fortunately, it is possible to reduce this ringing when it is problematic by operating the instrument at higher amplitudes (with $\mathrm{V}_{2}$ between -70 and -80 V ), and installing attenuators between the mainframe OUT connector and the jig IN connector. The attenuators also tend to absorb transmission line reflections, further improving the situation. The waveform on the right was obtained by setting $\mathrm{V} 1=+53 \mathrm{~V}$ and $\mathrm{V} 2=-74 \mathrm{~V}$, with 10 dB and 3 dB coaxial attenuators (for a total attenuation of 13 dB , or 4.5 ) installed on the mainframe output.

Both waveforms provide nearly the same $t_{R R}$ measurement, 4.0 ns versus 4.5 ns . (This is below the nominal intended $t_{R R}$ range of the instrument, which is 8 ns to 1 us.)

## INCORRECT ORIENTATION

The instrument and the DUT will not be damaged if the diode is installed with the incorrect orientation (i.e., with the anode and cathode reversed). However, incorrect waveforms will be generated.

## ACCESSIBLE VOLTAGES

The mainframe provides pulsed voltages of up to -82 V to the test jig. For this reason, the output is automatically disabled when the test jig lid is open. The lid must be closed to obtain measurements.

㐱 Shielded cabling should be used for all connections to the "IN" and "OUT" terminals on the test jig, and the "OUT" connector on the mainframe.

## STANDARD TEST JIG MECHANICAL ASPECTS

One AVX-TRR-MIX test jig is normally supplied with the mainframe, unless the customer has requested a different or additional test jigs.

## AVX-TRR-MIX TEST JIG

The AVX-TRR-MIX test jig accepts a range of through-hole and axial devices, using pin sockets and spring-loaded pins. It is intended for use with diodes in DO-41, TO-220, DO-204AR, TO-3 or similar packages. A photo of the arrangement is shown below:


The instrument and the DUT will not be damaged if the diode is installed with the incorrect orientation (i.e., with the anode and cathode reversed). However, incorrect waveforms will be generated.

The procedure for inserting most axial and TO-220 packages is straightforward. Simply insert the DUT between one of the Anode pin sockets (in the blue area above) and one of the Cathode sockets (in the red area above). Select the sockets with the most appropriate hole size, and try to minimize all lead lengths, to minimize parasitic inductance.

This jig will also accommodate a number of TO-3 configurations, outlined below. If the case is connected to the anode, and the pin(s) are used for the cathode, the arrangement shown below must be used:

This socket and spring pin provide mechanical support only. They are not electrically active.

This spring pin must contact the underside of the case. It provides the anode connection.

The cathode pin of interest must be inserted into this socket. For dualdiode devices, rotate the TO-3 package so that the
 desired diode cathode is inserted here.

If the case is connected to the cathode, and the pin(s) are used for the anode, the arrangement shown below must be used:

For TO-3 packages with Case = Cathode

The anode pin of interest must be inserted into this socket. For dualdiode devices, rotate the TO-3 package so that the desired diode anode is inserted here.

This socket and spring pin provide mechanical support only. They are not electrically active.


The IN, OUT, and CONTROL connectors are on the rear of the jig, below the hinges:


## TYPICAL RESULTS: 1N4937

Obtaining meaningful results with the AVR-EB4-B-NXPA requires care, experience, and an understanding of diode transient behavior and the impact of inductive and capacitive parasitics. To assist the user, typical results for commercially available diodes are provided below. The user should be able to reliably duplicate these results.

The On Semiconductor 1N4937 is a 1A, 600V DO-41 fast-recovery rectifier. With the amplitudes set to +55 V and -77 V , actual DUT current of +0.5 A and -1 A observed. The full waveform (approximately 100 us wide) is shown below. The reverse transient occurs 80 us after the start of the positive-going pulse.

$2 \mathrm{~V} / \mathrm{div} / 5 \Omega=400 \mathrm{~mA} / \mathrm{div} .20$ us/div.

The SYNC pulse occurs shortly before the beginning of the reverse pulse. (The SYNC pulse is used to trigger the oscilloscope, and the location of the rising edge of the SYNC pulse is denoted by the orange "T" marker in the waveform above.) Changing the time scale to zoom in on the 2 us wide reverse pulse gives:

$2 \mathrm{~V} / \mathrm{div} / 5 \Omega=400 \mathrm{~mA} / \mathrm{div} .400 \mathrm{~ns} / \mathrm{div}$.
The reverse recovery transient is clearly visible now. Zooming in further (with a veryhigh bandwidth oscilloscope) gives:

$100 \mathrm{mV} / \mathrm{div} \times 20 \mathrm{~dB} / 5 \Omega=200 \mathrm{~mA} / \mathrm{div} .50 \mathrm{~ns} / \mathrm{div}$.

The $t_{R R}$ recovery time to $10 \%$ of $I_{\text {RMAX }}$ was measured to be 140 ns .

To verify the $<1 \mathrm{~ns}$ switching timing, we zoom in further:


This waveform shows that the +0.5 A to -1 A switching time ( $10 \%-90 \%$ ) is 966 ps .
For this test, the 1N4937 was installed as shown below:


## SPECIALIZED / CUSTOMIZED TEST JIGS

## AVX-TRR-MELF-NXPA

The special-order AVX-TRR-MELF-NXPA may be used with the AVR-EB4-B-NXPA. This test jig is similar to the standard AVX-TFR-MIX jig described in the previous section, except that it is intended for use with SOD123W, SOD128, SOD123F, SOD323F, and similar surface-mount packages. The DUT is installed, using tweezers, between the two opposing flat-headed spring pins. For test purposes, it is best to install the DUT so that the flat leads are perpendicular to the circuit board, rather than parallel to it. This makes it easier to position the DUT with tweezers, and makes it easier to verify that the spring pin heads are making contact with the leads. A photo of an installed DUT is shown below:


The full test jig is shown below:


## TYPICAL RESULTS: PMEG3020DEP115

The NXP PMEG3020DEP115 is a surface-mounted 30V, 2A Schottky diode rectifier. It was installed in the AVX-TRR-MELF-NXPA as shown above.

Setting $\mathrm{V}_{1}=+11.6 \mathrm{~V}$ and $\mathrm{V}_{2}=-15 \mathrm{~V}$ gives $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{F}}=+100 \mathrm{~mA}$ and $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{R}}=-200 \mathrm{~mA}$. Under these conditions, the following waveform was obtained:


Under these conditions, $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{RR}}=18 \mathrm{~ns}$.
Some reflections trail the reverse recovery transient. This is caused by the fact that once the diode has stopped conducting, the coaxial cables are no longer terminated properly with a 50 Ohm impedance, so transmission line reflections occur. These reflections occur after the transient, and may be ignored.

Some reflections are also immediately after the + to - transition. These make exact measurement of $\mathrm{I}_{\text {RMAX }}$ awkward.

To fix both of these difficulties, user-supplied attenuators can be installed on the output connector of the mainframe. These attenuators will tend to absorb reflections. The
largest value of attenuation should be selected that will generate the desired current levels with $\mathrm{V} 2=-70$ to -80 V .

For instance, with an adjustable attenuator installed and set at 14 dB , and with $\mathrm{V} 1=$ +51.5 V and $\mathrm{V} 2=-74.5 \mathrm{~V}$, the following waveform was obtained:


Again, $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{RR}}=18 \mathrm{~ns}$, but the waveform is much "cleaner". The attenuator has absorbed the trailing reflections entirely.

## TROUBLESHOOTING

If you obtain "strange" output waveforms, or unexpected values of $t_{R R}$, keep these points in mind:

1) The test jig output must be terminated with 50 Ohms.
2) The coaxial cable connecting the test jig to the output module should normally be 2 meters in length.
3) If reflections are observed on the output waveform, install attenuators on the mainframe output connector and increase the programmed amplitude to compensate for the attenuation.
4) Keep device lead lengths as short as possible, to minimize parasitic inductance.
5) The test jig lid must be closed, or the pulser output will be disabled.

## PROGRAMMING YOUR PULSE GENERATOR

## KEY PROGRAMMING COMMANDS

The "Programming Manual for -B Instruments" describes in detail how to connect the pulse generator to your computer, and the programming commands themselves. A large number of commands are available; however, normally you will only need a few of these. Here is a basic sample sequence of commands that might be sent to the instrument after power-up:

| frequency 1000 Hz | (sets the frequency to 1000 Hz ) |

For triggering a single event, this sequence would be more appropriate:

To set the instrument to trigger from an external TTL signal applied to the rear-panel TRIg connector, use:

(sets the positive pulse amplitude to +20 V)
(sets the negative pulse amplitude to - 30 V)
(turns on the output)
```

These commands will satisfy $90 \%$ of your programming needs.

## MECHANICAL INFORMATION

## TOP COVER REMOVAL

If necessary, the interior of the instrument may be accessed by removing the four Phillips screws on the top panel. With the four screws removed, the top cover may be slid back (and off).

Always disconnect the power cord and allow the instrument to sit unpowered for 10 minutes before opening the instrument. This will allow any internal stored charge to discharge.

There are no user-adjustable internal circuits. For repairs other than fuse replacement, please contact Avtech (info@avtechpulse.com) to arrange for the instrument to be returned to the factory for repair. Service is to be performed solely by qualified service personnel.

食 Caution: High voltages are present inside the instrument during normal operation. Do not operate the instrument with the cover removed.

## RACK MOUNTING

A rack mounting kit is available. The -R5 rack mount kit may be installed after first removing the one Phillips screw on the side panel adjacent to the front handle.

## ELECTROMAGNETIC INTERFERENCE

To prevent electromagnetic interference with other equipment, all used outputs should be connected to shielded loads using shielded coaxial cables. Unused outputs should be terminated with shielded coaxial terminators or with shielded coaxial dust caps, to prevent unintentional electromagnetic radiation. All cords and cables should be less than $3 m$ in length.

## MAINTENANCE

## REGULAR MAINTENANCE

This instrument does not require any regular maintenance.
On occasion, one or more of the four rear-panel fuses may require replacement. All fuses can be accessed from the rear panel. See the "FUSES" section for details.

## CLEANING

If desired, the interior of the instrument may be cleaned using compressed air to dislodge any accumulated dust. (See the "TOP COVER REMOVAL" section for instructions on accessing the interior.) No other cleaning is recommended.
